Seesaw App

Red Hub students use the Seesaw App for their digital learning journal and as a form of communication to parents. Seesaw is another important way of reporting student achievements to parents and it will be used throughout the year. Once you have signed up to your child's account and been approved by your child's teacher, you can visit your child's digital learning journal. You can leave engaging and positive comments under your name and it can also be a conversation starter about the day.

Reading

Take Home Books

Since day one of the term the students have taken home a book as their take home book. The reader that your child brings home are not intended to be at a challenging text, just slightly below their instructional reading level. The reason for this being, reading at home is a chance for your child to consolidate their learning at school and work on building fluency and expression. Sometimes your child may have the same book for a couple of nights or might bring home the same book that they have had before. This is not an issue, as it is again helping to build fluency and expression. As comprehension is an important component of reading, it is important to talk about the text together after your child has read their book. Discuss the main events, the characters and what the story tells you about them, as well as any challenging words and what they might mean. Your child should read a range of fiction and nonfiction texts.

The student's reading should be recorded in their yellow reading journal which should be kept in their green folder.
